Infer means to suggest or make a hint based on facts. It is similar to a hypothesis.





These lesson ideas are suitable for K-2 students.


DUCK AND RABBIT APPRECIATION DAY

Celebrate ducks and rabbits with a day devoted to them.

. Start with a Duck! Rabbit! read aloud. Then introduce two classic books about ducks and rabbits. Make Way for Ducklings by Robert McCloskey.is a fictional picture storybook, but it is true to the things that ducks do. For example, ducks mate for life, they teach their young, and they nest. Have your students make a list of those things. Then read The Tale of Peter Rabbit by Beatrix Potter and do the same thing. What things does Peter do that real rabbits do? There are also things in the book that real rabbits don't do. Discuss them with your students

Make a Duck Hat!

MATERIALS NEEDED

Hat template (head, bill, and eyes) 12 x 18-inch or larger yellow construction paper

Orange crayon Black crayon

Scissors Clear tape

1. Using the template, cut out a 12-inch circle from the construction paper.


- 2. Fold the circle in half, then in half again to find perpendicu lar diameters. Cut along the diameters to point A. 1 inch
- 3. Bring point 1 to point 2, and tape. Do this four times.

Nose and teeth template

81/2 x 11-inch computer paper. Scissors

Clear tape

20 inches of ribbon 3/8 inch wide, or thin elastic band Pink crayon

- 1. Color the area between points 1 and 3 pink. 2. Cut out the circle and the rabbit teeth.
- 3. Cut inside the circle along the dotted lines.
- 4. Roll back point 3 and tape to point 4.
- 5. Roll back point 1 and tape to point 2.

Pre-reading Activity



Inferencing PPTs and Other Visuals



Inferences with the School Librarian - TEKS 5.10

Inference in reading is when you need to use the clues written in a story to draw a conclusion. In other words, you need to be a "word detective." You will not always be right when you draw a conclusion from a story, but the more you try, the more skilled you will become. Students play detective

<u>A Birthday Mystery - ReadWriteThink</u>

A small bark? It's a birthday puppy! What did you just do to solve the mystery of my birthday gift? MAKING INFERENCES means. Reading between the lines; Schema + Text Clues = Inference. You may hear it called. Infer. What can you infer about... Inferring. By saying the gift was a new puppy, you were inferring. Inference.

Inferencing PPT and Other Visuals

<u>Nonfiction Inferencing</u> - Drawing a conclusion: is the outcome of making an **inference**. Prediction: is an outcome about the future that you have inferred. The author/character implies, but you the **reader infer** when you make an educated guess. How do you know that you are being asked to make an **inference**?



Inference Games



<u>Detective</u> - Play the detective by reading the clues and solving the mystery using inference.

<u>Rags to Riches</u> - Try to become a millionaire! You will need to read the information given to you. Then, draw a conclusion or make an inference about the passage.

<u>Inference Riddle Game</u> - Successful readers make guesses based on what they read and what they already know. The object of this game is to infer what is being described by the clues you read.
